Thank you for your email of 7 June 2025 to Te Kaunihera o Pōneke | Wellington City Council (the Council) requesting information regarding usage of Wellington City Libraries. Your request has been considered under the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987 (LGOIMA). Please find my response below.

1. The number of visitors to each of the libraries in Wellington, broken down by year, for the past 10 years.

Please see attached, as **Appendix 01** to my response, tables showing the number of visitors to Wellington City Council managed libraries, for the financial years 2014-15 to 2023-24.

Across the ten years, a number of factors have impacted on the visitors (and book loans) such as closures or restrictions on services due to COVID-19, as well as closures for earthquakes in 2016. The most obvious example of this is the closure of the Central Library in March 2019, and the subsequent temporary central city branches that were established as a result. Another example is the Johnsonville branch that moved from a smaller premises on Broderick Road in 2019, to reopen at the Waitohi Hub with a significantly increased collection and space.

2. The number of books borrowed in each of the libraries in Wellington, broken down by year, for the past 10 years.

Please see attached, as **Appendix 02** to my response, tables showing the number of books issued by Wellington City Council managed libraries, for the financial years 2014-15 to 2023-24.

The books borrowed per branch relate to the location where the customer borrowed the book, rather than the holding branch of the book. Central Library book issues (following the closure of the building) relate to items issued directly from our Collection and Distribution Centre, such as items borrowed by during our Open Days, or customers wishing to have books couriered directly to their home.

3. The number of people enrolled with libraries in Wellington, broken down by year, for the past 10 years.

Please see attached, as **Appendix 03** to my response, a table showing the number of people enrolled with libraries in Wellington for the financial years 2014-15 to 2023-24.

During 2022-23, a review of the database was conducted, and details of customers who had not used the library for more than six years were removed from the database.

 The amount of money the Wellington City Council has allocated to libraries, broken down by year, for the past 10 years for the purchasing of books (i.e. not building expenditure).
