Ōwhiro Bay Residents Association - LTP submission

- 1. Climate Change Resilience:
 - Grade the Beach to avert or mitigate the next storm disaster
 - Review the vulnerabilities of the bridge with a view to strengthening it and options for restoration of services in the event of failure.
 - · Put in monitoring cameras to identify how the sea is behaving and plan ahead

2. Water:

- Resource the Owhiro Pilot to ensure it is the prototype for citywide multiparty processes that restore 3 water networks to a sound state.
- Confirm funding to fix public/private pipe failures to ensure Owhiro Stream and the Tapu Teranga Marine Reserve are fit for primary contact within a couple of years.
- The network outside the critical assets in the CBD. Fund water infrastructure renewals and upgrades to ensure the network is made fit-for-purpose.
- Resource appropriately to ensure the recommendations of the Mayoral Taskforce, particularly around resilience and water-sensitive urban design are implemented.

3. Landfill

- · Ensure the sludge is divorced from the landfill
- Option 4
- Visibility of the Moa Point Project budget allocation in the long term plan
- Visibility on environmental impacts and interconnectedness of the Landfill extension minimisation proposals and WCC's Zero Waste vision.
- We do not want to become the rubbish destination for the region. The Southern Landfill is no longer a suitable location or solution.
- We want a strong and robust plan for reducing all waste forms, a coordinated Greater
 Wellington approach that is 10 steps ahead of urban intensification.
- We want Wellington to become a Zero Waste Literate City the Zero Waste Capital with the Landfills repurposing to become state of the art Recycling Shopping Destination.



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


We have been working closely with the Council Parks and Open spaces team and since we last caught up have carried out the following:

- Site survey on site: heights of existing grass banks, record of mature trees, establish site boundaries.
- · Penetrometer test understanding of soil conditions.
- Green spaces review getting the proportion of open space right for the park.
- Engaged with Specialist designers for the skate ramp and pump track.
- Initial investigation around potential lizard presence on site.
- Initial engagement around the archeological context for the site.

- We have encouraged the community to continue inputting into the design and giving feedback as decisions are firmed up.






In summary:



Submission on WCC proposed 10-year Plan

Andrew Macbeth 20 May 2021

About me

- Lived in Wellington last six years
- Managed cycling programmes for Toronto City Council (7 years) and Brisbane (2 years)
- Worked as cycling consultant in NZ for 25 councils and central govt, including writing NZ cycling design guide
- Commuted 90,000 km to work by bike in four countries before retiring last year

Three waters

- Disappointed that Council is not considering water meters
- Should have been one of the options for consultation
- Many councils are doing this or have already done it
- Logical way to manage demand and find and fix leaks

Cycling

- Strongly support Option 4 accelerated full investment
- We really need to de-carbonise transport
- People keep asking for cycling to be easier and safer
- Lots of little, low cost, things that Council can do to support cycling
- Cost of full cycleways programme is peanuts compared with LGWM road and tunnel proposals

Central Library

- Support Option 1 strengthen now by exceeding debt limit
- Central library is much more than a place to borrow books
- Impact on rates is acceptable Auckland expects rates to rise 5% next year and 3.5% per annum after that

Other issues in my submission

- Lobby central government to share GST with local govt
- Require churches and govt departments to pay rates
- Raise extra revenue by having residents-only parking in more neighbourhoods and increasing fees – roads are public space
- Charge high rates for landowners doing land banking in key areas like CBD – especially surface parking lots





These families who want to make more journeys by bike say they would if we had more integrated cycleways.


We stay mostly off road, not brave enough to get from Kingston to the city with roads in current state, to many close calls!



Nora and I are lucky to have only a short commute mostly along the waterfront, but I would love to be able to take her further afield on my bike without having to fear for her life all the time.


