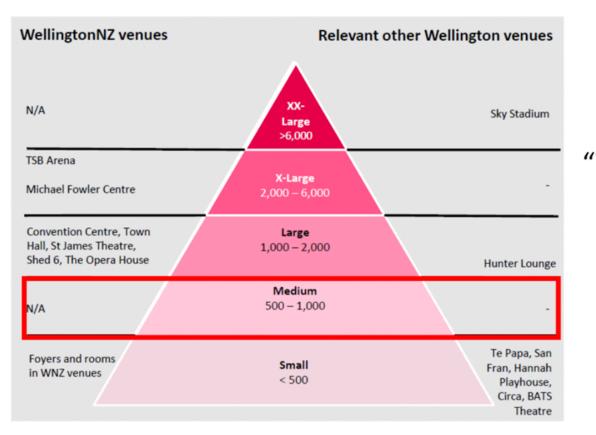

Overall perceptions of existing venues are relatively poor and there were many calls for a purpose built, mixed use venue somewhere in the 400-800 seat range. However, once again if such a venue is built it seems important to ensure it is not so expensive to build that most local organisations would be priced out of hiring it.

It also seems like an ideal opportunity to design in accessibility for children, people with disabilities and those who are not as familiar with the performing arts.

- * The gap in Wellington has always been for a concert room that is something between the llott size which is only about 330 ish or something and the Town Hall, which is 1800. In my dream world, Wellington would have superb concert venue with seating of about 800."
- Build at least one medium-sized venue with seating capacity of around 600."
- A venue in the 200-400 seat range, with a food size stage and a good acoustic is very much needed.

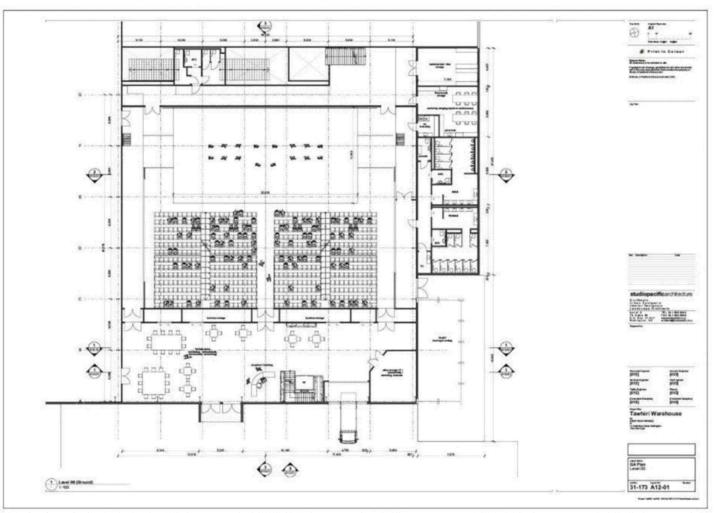


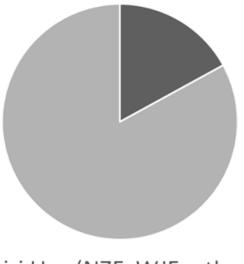

Some additional notes re: BID targeted rate

We were delighted in March this year to achieve a successful result as part of our Bid boundary expansion to include businesses in the Lyall Bay and Rongotai area. 30% of the eligible voters voted (minimum required is 25%) and of those 72% returned votes in favour of the BID (minimum required is 50%). The capital value of the properties of those where the owner has voted in support of the BID was 59% (minimum required 50%).

This fantastic outcome was the result of many months of hard work and engagement with businesses, including door to door visits from all of the Kilbirnie Business Network Committee members, and great support from council's Business Engagement Senior Advisor Rula Awad. It was also made possible in no small way by the investment of \$25,000 by Wellington City Council to help fund some outside expertise in engaging with businesses via Business Lab, without which we would not have been successful.

Since the poll, we have communicated the result with voters, held a Special General Meeting of the Kilbirnie Business Network to formally receive the result and request council to strike the increased targeted rate of \$155,000 in the 2021/22 financial year, and co-opted a n umber of business owners onto our Committee to help us finalise our plans for the expanded area and ensure representation from the expansion area.

However we are now somewhat dismayed, and not a little annoyed, that despite all our efforts, including meeting all timeframes required of us from Council, we have now been advised that the proposed rate cannot be included in the LTP because it wasn't included in the public consultation material, and that for the rate to be adopted it will need to be included in the 2022/23 Annual Plan.

We are extremely concerned with this development, particularly considering the potential loss of momentum due to a 12 month delay, the risk of having to re-ballot the expansion area if there are too many changes in businesses and property owners over the next 12 months and the impact it will have on our plans to improve economic development in the area.

We wish to point out that those most directly affected by the target rate – commercial property owners – were directly engaged with and polled and we had overwhelming support for the expansion.

The council is only the conduit to collect the targeted rate, on behalf of the Business Association, and hand over the funds as it is the only entity that can collect the rate. This is a different rate to the normal council rates and has very little impact in terms of the Long term Plan.

As with all recommendations to council from officers, we are aware that councillors have the ability to make a decision that is different to officers' recommendations and we wish to ask council to approve the inclusion of the increased BID targeted rate for the 2021/22 financial year for the following reasons:

- There has been a significant financial and time investment made by both the Kilbirnie Business Network and Wellington City Council in the ballot process.
- The expansion ballot was run following all council approved processes and timeframes and the result more than met the minimum requirements of the council's BID policy and was well supported by business and property owners.
- Those most directly affected by the target rate commercial property owners were directly engaged with and polled and we had overwhelming support for the expansion.
